How well does your council protect biodiversity?

Forest & Bird has rated each coastal council on the regulations and resources they have in place to protect vulnerable species from vehicles driving on beaches in their area.

The plants and animals shown are just some of many needing protection on our coasts.

The Golden Standard: Dunedin City Council

Policy: Vehicles are not permitted on Dunedin beaches unless they are being used to launch or retrieve a vessel.

Resourcing and partnership: DCC partners with DoC to deliver the Community Ranger Programme; a seasonal, educative initiative to improve compliance with DCC's **Reserves and Beaches Bylaw.**

Great news for Dunedin's precious wildlife! Forest & Bird has scored Dunedin City Council top in

NZ for protecting coastal species. Rangers employed by DCC and the Department of Conservation are visiting beaches to help locals look out for wildlife and care for the environment. They provide advice on ways to safely avoid sea lions, remind people that driving on beaches is not allowed and dogs must be on a lead near wildlife.

Forest & Bird members are concerned in other areas of NZ vehicles drive on beaches with no regard to nesting seabirds or resting marine mammals.

Forest & Bird recommend that councils:

1. Use the Land Transport Act (specifically 22AB(1)(f)&(g)) to restrict the use of motor vehicles on unformed legal roads (beaches) for the purpose of protecting the environment, instead of relying on provisions in the LGA which does not allow bylaw creation for environmental reasons.

2. Put more resource (dedicated staff and budget) into compliance and enforcement of regulations.





Forest & Bird recommend that councils:

3. Provide better information to the public about driving on beaches, such as dedicated webpages on council websites and clear and adequate signage at beach entry points.

4. Improve cooperation across and between councils, the Department of Conservation and the NZ Police to enforce local regulation (bylaws) and national legislation (LTA, MMPR).
