








Background

MSc - Understanding the potential exposure of coastal marae and urupā to sea level rise






- 191 marae are within 1 km
 of the coastline
- 41 of these are at risk to a
 100-year ESL + 3m SLR












Framework to support adaptation/relocation decision-making


