Wattle control and restoration planting at Castlecliff Beach, Whanganui

The local Castlecliff Coast Care group at Castlecliff Beach near Whanganui are managing are large area of duneland where the mid to backdunes are dominated by exotic species particularly coastal wattle.

Although some foredune work is carried out each year to plant gaps in the sand binding vegetation to reduce localised erosion, the majority of the work by the Castlecliff Coast Care group is focused on the backdunes. Weed control is the first priority for each new area that is to be restored before any new native seedlings are planted out.

Help with the weed control and planting is provided by local schools and heavier chores done by special working parties. Along with the planting, habitat restoration for local fauna includes providing sheltered sites for skinks and insects using logs and small corogated sheets placed on the dunes.

Wattle control methods

Graham and Lyn Pearson who lead the group's work have had very good success in removing coastal wattle of all sizes and ages using using a variety of methods.

For the larger/mature trees cuttling the trunks below the lowest green foliage is sufficent to kill the plant. Due to the spreading nature of the lower branches, care needs to be taken to ensure all limbs are removed. Smaller plants can be pulled out by hand.

Cutting the wattle correctly significantly reduces the need for spraying regrowth later. Cut material needs to be grouped for either burning or chipping later on. If chipped, it can then be used very effectivly around new plantings as a weed suppresent and to help retain moisture during the summer months.

March-June 2014 site updates in brief...

Northland

Field trips were made to Waipu Cove, Ruakaka Beach, Tauranga Beach, Taipa, Rarawa, Ahipara, and beaches on the Karikari Peninsula. This included reassessment of transects monitoring coastal wattle growth with the Friends of Rarawa group.

Auckland

Reassessment of the large Coprosma acerosa (Sand coprosma) planting trial at Te Henga Beach, West Auckland

Horowhenua-Whanganui

Inspections of several beaches along the south west coast North Island were completed from Foxton Beach to Patea.

Taranaki

Reassessment of the Living Legends planting on the backdunes at Te Rewarewa, New Plymouth. Other sites included beaches at Motu, Opunake and Oakura.

Wellington

Several sites inspected Wellington region including Petone, Whitireia Park, Te Horo Beach, Waitohu Beach, Paraparaumu Beach and part of the Onoke Spit.

Canterbury

Further assessment completed at Caroline Bay and Otipua Beach, Timaru, where significant restoration work is being undertaken and monitored.
